Message from the Chair

Our year began with several planting sessions during January and February at Alder Creek Farm. The planting was a follow up to the restoration work conducted in December of 2008. Adults and school children planted approximately 2000 cuttings of willow, red-osier dogwood, and ninebark. We also planted 100 spruce, cedar and hemlock trees. Thanks to everyone for your work, especially Doug Firstbrook and the ACF Stewardship Committee for your leadership.

During April and May, Peter Walczak, the Trust's Watershed Education project coordinator, led field trips for each Nehalem Grade School class. This year's locations for the field trips included Twin Rocks, Cape Meares, Bar View Park, Nehalem Bay State Park, Oswald West, and Alder Creek Farm. The curriculum topics covered a wide range of natural science concepts, vocabulary, and basic procedures. This project is funded by the Eugene Schmuck Foundation, the Tillamook Estuaries Partnership and the Trust.

In May the Trust hosted TEP's "Down by the Riverside" event at Alder Creek Farm. Three classes of third graders from Nehalem and Garibaldi Elementary schools attended the event. Hands-on learning stations included: Alien Invasion/Chips & Dips, Amazing Amphibians, Build a Bug, Migration Headache, the Good/The Bad & The Riparian, and Wonderful Watershed Surprises. Coordinator Dean Bones was strongly supported by Peter Walczak, Chris Rombough, Claudine Rehn, Vivi Tallman, Neahkahn High School students, elementary teachers, parents and members of the Trust Board. What a great day to learn!

Restoration work continues at our Vosberg Creek property this summer. The Trust will partner with ODFW and the Lower Nehalem Watershed Council in the implementation of an OWEB restoration grant to remove a weir from the lower section of Vosberg Creek, which will provide access to the creek for salmonids. Large wood will be placed in the creek to enhance the habitat for their spawning, rearing, and winter refuge. This work will be done in late summer. In addition, 200 cedar and hemlock seedlings will be planted in late fall of this year or early spring, 2010.

Tillamook PUD Grant Supports Alder Creek Farm Greenhouse Upgrades



Thanks to funding from Tillamook Public Utility District (TPUD) the Greenhouse at Alder Creek Farm is enjoying some long planned for upgrades. We were fortunate to receive a \$4,300 grant award from TPUD to expand our planting area, add exhaust ventilation and install a semi-automated watering system. The new planting boxes are already producing vegetables and we are in the planning stages for the other upgrades.

Good news! Membership in the Trust is growing. Along with more members comes the necessary task of streamlining our internal membership procedures. We ask for your patience as we transition from membership renewals via the newsletter to membership renewal reminders as a separate administrative process.

Here's how the new membership renewal procedure will work: 60 days prior to your membership renewal date you will receive a packet which will include a reminder letter stating the amount of your last membership donation, a membership renewal form and a self-addressed envelope to return your membership check and renewal form. In the event that we don't hear from you in 30 days, we will send a reminder mailing which will include another letter, form and return envelope. If you have been renewing through the June newsletter you will be receiving your renewal notice shortly. The Trust thanks you in advance for responding to the first mailing to save valuable paper, printing and mailing resources.

Nehalem Teaching Trail Receives Grant Support and Help from Local Students

For the third consecutive year, the Tillamook County Cultural Coalition has granted funds, this year \$3,000, towards the design and creation of the Nehalem Teaching Trail. Trail designer Doug Deur, an Arch Cape resident and ethnobotanist, has extensive knowledge of northwest indigenous people and their management of landscape and caring for plant communities on which they depended.

The trail consists of a variety of "islands" linked by a walking path, representing six different local habitats prized by native people for food, shelter, clothing tools

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and ceremonial use. The trail has been laid out and the plant lists have been completed (see these documents at www.nehalemtrust.org). This year's work will be to flesh out the design and place plants in the first two of the trail habitats: rocky peaks and forest margin/shrub.

With the guidance of LNCT board member Vivi Tallman, students from throughout Tillamook County are assisting with the maintenance of the trail and its plantings. For more information about the trail or volunteer opportunities call the Trust office, 503-368-3203.
